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Why You Need a Will

Even if the size if your estate isn't presently large, you simply **must** have a Last Will and Testament if you have children; it is of the utmost importance so that in the event of your unexpected death you can

- determine the percentage of distribution;
- provide for a guardian; and
- otherwise make the important arrangements for your children's care and custody.

It is particularly important to have a Last Will and Testament if you are not formally married but have children with a partner. Although you may consider yourselves husband and wife, New York law **does not recognize** 'common-law' marriage. Your children's rights will be much more difficult to establish and there may be instances where the rights of young children could be lost entirely. It is especially difficult, and at times impossible, to prove the relationship where the children live in another country.

For these and many other important reasons, you should be sure you have a current, valid Last Will and Testament. Feel free to call for an appointment to discuss this or any other legal issue.
